1) Course brief / Abstract:

As an introductory module, the course would endeavor to make students comprehend the significance of communication skills for academic and professional purposes. Hence, through a series of discussions and interactive exercises they would understand the various constituents of communication in terms of ideas, their logical development in relation to an audience and the integration of story telling as a technique to make the delivery an effective one. The course also takes a brief look at various modes of communication.

2) Course Objectives:

The course aims towards making students:

- 1. Build an understanding of the communication process through its elements
- 2. Undertake a critical inquiry of communication patterns in different contexts

3) Prerequisites:

The instructor expects the students to be highly interactive and participative in classroom activities and assignments. Academic rigour is imperative to the smooth functioning of the class.

4) Learning Outcomes:

The course will build a solid understanding of the 'what' and 'who' of communication and clearly see through examples how communication fails without these two. It will make the students delve into the 'how' of communication keeping the what and who in mind. Students will be participants in various exercises individually and in groups. Especially in the latter, they will learn to relate to each other collaboratively. The course will very strongly rely on peer evaluation. Thus, the course will 'immerse' students in the values propounded by the Anant Fellowship Program.
